TRIUMPHEST '87

TRIUMPHEST '87 will be hosted by the Desert Centre Triumph Reegister of America (Phoenix area) at the Palace Station Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas, Nevada on 16, 17, and 18 October, 1987. The hotel has been very helpful and willing to work with us in any way necessary. Friday afternoon and evening will be given over to registration, visiting commercial participants and social activities. Saturday will be a full day of events, both driving and static, including; a planned rally, a funkhana, a funcours judging of cars, Technical sessions, etc. An awards banquet is planned for Saturday evening that will include door prizes and a raffle. Sunday will be devoted to social concerns and preparing to depart. The schedule is as yet tentative but promises to offer something for everyone.

Costs are as follows for the hotel: \$45 per night, single or double. \$52 per night, triple. The buffet will be approximately \$14.00 per person, and includes three entres and a full range of ancillaries. More information on regristration costs will follow soon. A packet for preregristration will be on the way as soon as we get all the components together. The Palace Station Hotel-Casino is nice looking and is presently being remodeled to include the grounds and redocrated rooms. It is a two-story, horseshoe-shaped building enclosing two pools, a children's pool, and two spas. Eight or nine restaurants and eating places are on the grounds as well as 55,000 sq ft casino. The hotel is about 2 blocks off the strip at a very convenient freeway exit. So, everything is easy access without putting us at a disadvantage as far as traffic or loitering. The rooms are scheduled to be in a block, so we will only bother and be bothered by ourselves.

This promises to be the biggest and best TRIUMPHEST yet, so bring as many of your club members as possible and let's celebrate.
