SUNDAY'S MUSEUM TRIP


Six carloads left the K-Mart parking area (almost on schedule).

TECH TIPS

CALIBRATING YOUR TR'S TEMPERATURE GAUGE Do you motor around town with your TR in summer weather and watch your temperature gauge with paranoid anticipation? Because there is no temperature degree markings (at least on the TR-6), it is difficult to tell just how hot you really are unless the car pukes the contents of its radiator out on the pavement.

Here is a simple way to calibrate your temperature gauge for about \$10. and an hour or so of work.

Buy two additional thermostats at your local parts store (I like the Robert Shaw thermostats at Checker, about \$5. each) with setpoints above and below your current thermostat. Install them one at a time and take the car out on an open stretch of road on a cool (relatively speaking, of course) evening and note the point on the gauge where the thermostat opens.

I found that on my TR-6 that a 160F thermostat opening corresponded to the first quarter mark on the gauge and a 195F corresponded to between the three-quarter mark and the red zone. I'm sure that there is variation with other cars so you should check yours. By the way, water boils at about 245F with a 13.5 psig radiator cap.

This calibration procedure assumes that your cooling system is in reasonable condition and that when the thermostat opens, it at least regulates the water temperature for a little while before your engine temperature races towards self detruction.

Just one final note. Last winter, what I was reasonable sure that the coolant temperature was being regulated by the thermostat, I noticed that the temperature gauge seldom read the same on two different occasions. Mike Holden (Auto Britannia) told me to make sure the sender was properly grounded to the block and the extra resistance wasn't being introduced with pipe dope or teflon tape on the sender's threads. Make sure you don't have this problem before you try to calibrate your gauge.

TR-7 FUEL INJECTION

While installing fuel injection on my TR-7 Spider, I ran into a problem. The rubber vibration damper, between the intake manifold and the plenum chamber, had become brittle and broke when touched. There are no replacements available that I know of. So I went to the local parts store (Pep Boys) and found a radiator hose that, when I cut the top connection off, I wound up with a replacement for the part. The hose is a No. 452 (Pep Boys); it also has No. L13BOAG on it. I hope this helps someone else out. I did discover that Bosch has some of the major parts like the injectors, ECU, gaskets, auxiliary air valves, etc. from your local supplier.





TECH TIPS - CONTINUED

BATTERY CORROSION

To avoid acid residue build up on battery terminal posts and cable clamps, place a copper penny on top of the battery between the battery posts. (The copper penny will usually stay in place without falling off.) The copper in the penny will absorb the acid residue from the posts and keep the terminal posts and cable clamps clean. On older batteries that appear to give off more acid residue, add an additional penny and place each penny one to two inches from the posts. Make sure that there are no exposed areas of the battery cables near the post terminal clamps, since the stranded copper cables will also absorb acid residue. In about 6 to 9 months, the penny will turn into a small lump of greenish powder. Merely wipe off the powder with a paper towel and replenish with another copper penny as required.
